

Procurement Act 2023

Overview

- Dynamic Markets: Expands upon Dynamic Purchasing Systems (DPS) with broader applications and flexible joining rules for suppliers.

Transparency and Reporting

- Mandatory Publication of Procurement Documents: Requires public access to notices, contracts, and modifications via a central platform.
- Enhanced Reporting Requirements: Mandates contract performance tracking through key performance indicators (KPIs).

Social Value and Community Impact

- Encourages commissioners to consider social value in procurement decisions, supporting community benefits and sustainable practices.
- Facilitates collaboration with VCFSE sectors to enhance community engagement and service delivery.

Implications for Health and Social Care

Building on the Health and Care Act 2022, the Procurement Act 2023 offers a more flexible approach to commissioning healthcare services. Key points include:

Exemption from Competitive Tendering: NHS commissioners can bypass competitive tendering when it does not add value, reducing bureaucracy.
